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
### **Dear School Community**


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### **Enrichment Programme Spring Term 2023**

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
### Mrs Mills' Christmas Recommended Reads

# A true Christmas classic and one that should be on everyone's reading list!


Ebenezer Scrooge is a miserly old skinflint. He hates everyone, especially children.

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Congratulations to Matty in Yr 13 who has successfully sold both his pieces of work that are on display in the Rugby Open gallery. We are all proud of you.







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
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## **Rugby Town Concert Band**

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### Christmas can be a tough time for everyone because expectations are high and there is a phoney pressure to 'have a good time'.



But as many people will know, family relationships can be fraught, distant and a source of pain. The idealised images of happy families around the dinner table that feature in Christmas advertising and the media at this time of year are just that: unrealistic. Life is complex and messy, and picture-postcard perfection is just a John Lewis or M&S film-set. Spending more time with our families and sharing special moments together can be idyllic but for some children this is not the case.

#### December sees a spike in safeguarding issues

There is a darker side to the festive season that we must address and that is recognising that some children may experience a tough time. For schools, this is a time of year, along with other holiday periods when it is difficult to monitor the wellbeing of our students. December sees a spike in safeguarding issues and every year the NSPCC report increasing numbers of children phoning them for help because relationship tensions among families tend to come to a head over the Christmas break. This Christmas, of course, has the added pressure of the cost of living crisis and the impact that has on many of our families.

#### Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility

Safeguarding is the responsibility of <u>everyone</u> and at this time of year, we have to be extravigilant and offer support where we can and be proactive where we suspect or see the signs of abuse and neglect and seek the help of the police and social services. The rights of the child come first and all children have a right to protection from violence, exploitation, abuse and neglect.

Your Children have a right to feel safe and secure wherever they are spending their Christmas so here are some important helplines that we want to remind you of:

- If you need to get in touch out of usual office hours, please contact the **Emergency Duty Team** immediately by calling **01926 886922**.
- If you think that a child is at immediate risk, contact the Police immediately by calling 999.
