Message from the Principal

Thank you to everyone who took the time to participate in the The Big Ashlawn Parent Survey. Approximately 40% of families contributed. We hope to continue to build our response rate in the future.

As you will know, schools are experiencing extremely high levels of staff absence and this has meant that, at Ashlawn, we have had to ask some groups of students to work independently on tasks set by their teachers who are absent due to illness. We do our best to employ supply teachers but they are not readily available. If you, or someone you know, is a qualified teacher but not currently working, please let us know if you'd be interested in working directly with us on a casual basis as a supply teacher.

While we are doing everything we can to avoid partial closures, please be aware that we may need to switch to remote learning for one or more year groups should we be unable to ensure that staffing levels are high enough to ensure safe supervision of students. Depending on staff availability, remote learning may be task based rather than live online lessons as is our usual practice. We will keep this situation under review and will only move to remote learning as a last resort.

Student case rates also continue to be kept under review. Cases are currently slightly higher than normal and we are monitoring this closely. Should they rise further we may need to revert to the wearing of masks on site again.

While it can seem dispiriting to refer to cases and masks again, in school our students and staff continue to carry on as usual showing wonderful resilience. We have been so pleased to note that achievement points continue to be awarded in high numbers and that our students are engaged in earning rewards and recognition for their excellent work and behaviour.



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
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Music Success

Poppy Mattock in year 11 has gained a place in Birmingham Symphony Hall's Project Remix!



Students will be mentored through weekly rehearsals by a team of CBSO musicians before culminating in a live performance at Symphony Hall on Sunday 20th February 2022.

Project Remix fuses well-known music with contemporary orchestral arrangements. 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



LGBTQ+ History Month

This month we will be celebrating LGBTQ+ History. This year's theme "The Arc is Long" is inspired by a Martin Luther King quote:

'The arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends towards justice.'


The quote is thought to mean that although it is taking a long time, we are curving/moving towards social justice and fairness.

This theme provides us with the opportunity to explore the idea of social justice and changing attitudes towards LGBT+ people. While we have come a long way in terms of inclusion and attitudes towards same gender relationships and equal marriage, there is still a great deal of work that can happen in terms of positive trans (including non -binary) representation and inclusion.

Students will be exploring the Key Terms and Definitions used to describe the LGBTQ community and will be playing the traditional board game 'GUESS WHO' in order to practise using this terminology.

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Relationships and Sex Education at home! (RSE)

Following a recent survey carried out by the Sex Education Forum it transpires that there are limited conversations taking place about relationships and safe sex when talking with parents and carers at home.

The survey showed that one in four young people (25%) had never been spoken to and the young people who did experience this type of conversation had only had one big talk or a few separate discussions. Only one in six young people surveyed had regular discussions with parents and carers about RSE.

It is so important the Relationships and Sex is discussed at home. We want to work as a team with you to educate young people about how to stay safe.

Many adults find the topic difficult to discuss and we understand that but it is essential that it is not a taboo subject. Big Talk Education offers some great advice for parents and has a FAQ page about why we are asking you to support us.
