Message from the Principal

Happy New Year! It was wonderful to welcome our students back for the start of term on Wednesday. Our students bring energy and excitement to the building and we miss them when they are away.

All students had a start of term induction with a reminder of expectations. During this session, we reminded students of the behaviours that lead to success. We call them the four R's and they are as follows:

- RESPECT: Learning with others
 (Being kind, relating well to others, following instructions, being polite, valuing property and equipment, valuing and celebrating each other's differences.)
- ♦ REFLECTIVENESS: Taking charge of your learning (Improving as a learner, correcting behaviour without reminders, accepting consequences, reflecting on how to improve and on feedback to improve work.)
- RESILIENCE: Enjoying the feeling of learning
 (Managing self and coping with challenges, not giving up when things are challenging, the ability to recover from setbacks, arriving on time and ready to learn, using time effectively to maximise learning.)
- RESOURCEFULNESS: Thinking in different ways

 (Thinking about and improving past performance, taking pride in work, being equipped and ready to learn, asking questions and making links between different topics and adapting to different situations.)

You will notice that most of the reward points your children receive this term are aligned with these behaviours and we hope that you will join us in talking to them about how they are showing these behaviours at home or in their activities outside of school.

Thank you to the many parents of students in Years 7 – 11 who contacted us to give us feedback about our inspirational speaker, Hezron Brown. It was a great way to start the term and he really allowed us to appreciate that, in the words of a Year 7 student, "It doesn't matter how bad you think you've messed up, there is always a chance to make things change for the better."

Our students made us proud with the **respect** that they showed to Hezron and the way that they **reflected** on his story and the lessons they could learn from him. We hope that he will inspire everyone to be even more **resilient** and **resourceful** in the future.

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Knife Crime Awareness Day

Police Officers from Rugby Safer Neighbourhood Team will visit Ashlawn School on Thursday 13 January to engage with pupils as part of the knife crime prevention campaign Operation Sceptre.

Operation Sceptre is a national knife crime prevention intensification week that takes place twice a year, supporting the work Warwickshire Police carry out all year to ensure people are safe from knife crime in their community.

Officers undertake a range of activities including educational programmes to raise awareness of the dangers and consequences of carrying a knife and the risks of grooming and exploitation by gangs.

As part of the initiative, Warwickshire Police will be taking a metal detection knife arch to schools within the county. Whilst there is not a big knife problem within Warwickshire schools, working with them is the most effective way to get this important message to children.

A knife arch will be placed at the entrance to Ashlawn School on Thursday requiring students to walk through it. This offers a way of opening positive and friendly debate around the reasons why some young people choose to carry a knife and why it is safer not to carry them and walk away from harm.

Warwickshire Police is committed to making sure communities are safe and feel safe. We would like to thank our local police officer Naomi Elcock, parents and students for their support and forward thinking, proactive approach towards knife crime prevention.

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Hezron Brown

On Wednesday 6 January we welcomed Hezron Brown to join us in school for our 'Reset' day. Hezron won the Pride of Britain award for the Prince's Trust in 2019 for his contribution to young people.

Hezron Brown was living on the streets from age 13 and from then got involved in street gangs. When given the opportunity to turn his life around, Hezron left the gang culture behind and now gives young people motivational speeches and helps those who are at risk of slipping into the same position in which he once found himself.

Hezron spoke to students in Year's 7—11 about his story and the reception from our students was superb. You could have heard a pin drop in the room as he shared his journey and how he has overcome some of life's worst challenges. Our students asked appropriate and heart warming questions and Hezron answered them with honesty.

The message that he gave to our students was 'You Are Destined For Greatness'. Hezron discussed how each of his negative actions had a consequence and that you must never give up on trying to better yourself.

Hezron enjoyed the day as much as us and gave us the following feedback:

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
