RAISING AWARENESS ON KNIFE CRIME: OPERATION SEPTRA AT ASHLAWN

This term, we partnered with Rugby Police to host Operation Septra, a powerful knife crime awareness day designed to educate and empower students while highlighting the importance of community and respect.

The day began with police officers conducting gate checks as students arrived - both a demonstration of safety measures and an opportunity to engage students in positive discussions about stop and search practices and their role in protecting the community.


Assemblies for all year groups featured real-life examples of confiscated items, illustrating the importance of proactive action in preventing knife crime. Officers emphasised that safeguarding starts with awareness and that collaboration between individuals and the community is essential to make a difference.

Year 10 students took part in interactive workshops using VR headsets, immersing themselves in realistic scenarios related to knife crime. This innovative approach offered a first-hand perspective on the emotional and practical consequences of carrying knives. Many students described the experience as deeply eye-opening, helping them gain a better understanding of the risks and repercussions.

The day was a reminder of the importance of Ashlawn's core pillar, Respect. Through

GEOGRAPHY

This half term has been another busy one in geography!

Year 7 have been enquiring about how rivers shape our world, creating comic strips showing all the different pathways water can take through the hydrological cycle.

Year 8 have been studying hazards. The Risky World unit includes earthquakes and how people can better prepare for them.

Year 9 have been considering how we will be able to feed the world's population by 2050. They have compared diets across different countries, looked at the factors that can lead to food insecurity and researched the 'food miles' that can go into a meal.

POLITICS WITH RUGBY MP JOHN SLINGER

Rugby MP, John Slinger, met with students on the Student Leadership Programme to deliver an insightful talk about life in politics.

He discussed the important role of Parliament in shaping the nation and supporting local communities, as well as the skills and pathways young people can pursue for a future in politics. The session provided an excellent opportunity for students to deepen their understanding of British democracy and the importance of representation.

Following his talk, Mr Slinger held a Q&A session with the Student Council. Students asked thoughtful questions about his career, personal experiences and pressing local issues in Rugby, demonstrating their keen interest.

The event was well attended, and Mr Slinger may have left with some potential future work experience candidates!







NATIONAL GREEN CAREERS WEEK

This November, students in Years 7-13 enjoyed inspiring presentations and workshops led by Jo Russell, Stacey Green and Rhiannon Williams from Stoford Planning and Property.

They showed pathways into town planning, STEM and the Green Careers Industry.

Additional guest speakers from the Women in Property network shared career insights and Nicola Smith, Rugby Borough Council's Chief Officer for Growth and Investment, joined to inspire students about future opportunities in sustainable careers.

It was a great opportunity for students to explore career options and plan for their futures.



CAREERS FAIR

In October we hosted a careers fair with providers from sectors including engineering, healthcare, manufacturing, education and the army.

Representatives from the NHS, Fortem Solutions, Warwickshire College Group, LISI Aerospace and CAVA shared insights on higher education, apprenticeships and university pathways for KS3 and KS4 students. Parents were also invited to attend after school.

Students explored career options, developed employability skills and accessed valuable resources like labour market information and post-school pathways, supporting our career-focused learning through Unifrog.

The event was especially helpful for our Year 9 students as they begin considering their subject options.







WARWICKSHIRE YOUNG HIGH SHERIFF FINALIST

Scarlett D in Year 10 represented Ashlawn as one of 25 finalists in the Warwickshire Young High Sheriff for a Day competition at Rugby High School for Girls.

Finalists were invited to meet the High Sheriff of Warwickshire, Rajvinder Kaur Gill and other dignitaries.

To enter, students from Years 10-13 submitted essays, poems or videos on tackling crime and supporting their community. Scarlett's entry, which focused on reducing youth crime and helping young offenders reintegrate into society, was praised by judge Sophie Hilleary, last year's High Sheriff, as one of her and her husband's favourite entries.







SCARLETT'S ENTRY:

One of the main responsibilities of a High Sheriff is to help out the surrounding community. I've always tried to help others and my family, whether it's through helping someone during a lesson or just helping out a family member with fixing something or shopping.

Being High Sheriff for a day would give me a good chance to extend that help to the people who need it most. I'd focus on raising awareness about causes that bring people together, like providing safety in the community.

Youth crime is a major problem in both my hometown of Rugby but countrywide. This affects many underage people who are either directly involved or who have become associated with a crime through others.

One way I would help stop youth crime is to make a program for children living in poverty, since 10% of violence and robberies are caused by children who are on the poorer side of living.

An example of this could be to help children who are in juvenile detention centres get themselves back into normal life by giving them proper housing, a job, if they are old enough, and a proper education.

Over 50% of children in UK detention centres miss out on a decent education. This can mean these youths are unable to continue on, following release, to get regular jobs, resulting in them turning to crime once again in order to survive.

Often, it's noted people as young as the age of 12 years old are getting into situations that they shouldn't have to be in. When crime happens to those at a young age, around 13-18 years old, they would likely expect to come out of prison and return to their homes and normal life as before.

However, that is not the case since 16% of ex-offenders end up becoming homeless and struggle with life out on the streets. 16% may not seem very high, but if you consider the population of under 16s in the UK is 4.71 million then 16% of these ex-offenders are actually around 753,600 children becoming homeless after their sentence is finished.

This can often lead to these juveniles becoming repeat offenders just so they the means to have a place to live.

I believe, for this reason, that as well as just homes they should be able to easily obtain their own private quarters, or perhaps even be given a small individual flat, in case they have issues with trust resulting from their past crimes and experiences associated with that and needing that extra security.

Unfortunately, this mistrust could make juveniles not want to trust those people willing to help them.

A possible solution to this could be to publicise these options to them on billboards, posters or leaving leaflets in public spaces (which include QR Codes or internet links to give further information and show they are legitimate).

This way these people will know they have help available to them when they may be too ashamed or proud to ask for help.

We are exceptionally proud of Scarlett for her thoughtful and passionate entry and look forward to seeing her future successes!





ENGLISH

DICKENS DAY: A CELEBRATION OF LITERATURE, FUN AND FESTIVITIES!

Year 7 and 8 English students took a day to celebrate the legacy of Charles Dickens, the renowned 19th-century author whose works have become cornerstones of English literature.

Dickens Day offered students an exciting opportunity to dive into the world of Victorian England and explore the timeless stories and characters created by one of the most influential writers in literary history

A JOURNEY INTO DICKENS' WORLD

Dickens Day is rooted in this half term's units about Charles Dickens, which explore his life, the cultural context of his works, fascinating facts about his childhood, struggles, and his rise to fame.

Students discovered how his works, such as Oliver Twist and A Christmas Carol, shed light on Victorian society, with a particular focus on Christmas as popularised by the author.

The day provided an opportunity to discuss themes like poverty, class disparity, and social reform, helping students connect literature with the world around them, participating in 19th century games, Christmas decoration making, writing stories, poetry and letters, whilst also exploring the true meaning of Christmas, instilling values of kindness, creativity, and collaboration.

Teachers had fun dressing as their favourite Dickens characters including the miserly Ebenezer Scrooge, the three ghosts and Jacob Marley.

Students participated in dramatic readings and performances, reenacting famous scenes from A Christmas Carol. These readings helped to bring Dickens' words to life in a creative and engaging manner. It was fantastic to see our young readers engaging with literature in such an interactive and meaningful way.

One Year 7 student said: "A Christmas Carol really has a moral to the story. It makes you realise that you should be kind to everyone."

This event allowed students to connect with the past, reflect on its enduring lessons and embrace Ashlawn's CARE values. Experiences like these nurture a love for reading that can last a lifetime!










ENGINEERING

ROCKETRY COMPETITION

The department will continue designing and testing next term, aiming for success in the national finals!









We are thrilled to launch the Scalextric in Schools competition, giving Engineering students the opportunity to improve their CAD skills while testing their electronic and mechanical abilities.


MATHS

Working in small groups of like-minded others, they work together to solve complex problems.




